### **Gudrun Witzler: Value and impact of libraries [Wert und Wirkung von Bibliotheken]**

In early summer 2008 the Research Centre for Library Management, Evaluation and Organizational Development at Stuttgart Media University conducted a survey on structure and contents of LIS-courses at universities in the German speaking area. The now available results offer a current and condensed summary of the new situation. Compiled were core data on the LIS-courses but first of all the results focus on curricular aspects. Now it's possible to compare the courses regarding the content of the course.

### **Frank Simon-Ritz: Thuringia and its way towards a Library Law**

In addition the „library speech“ at Weimar from the Federal President Horst Köhler in 2007 and the recommendations of the inquiry commission „Culture in Germany“ of the German Parliament in the respect of libraries are discussed. The Library Law itself is critically discussed and also the shortcomings are mentioned.

With the aid of the FRBR, which also play an important part in the new cataloguing code RDA, users of a catalogue will be able to navigate the ‚bibliographic universe‘ in a new way. The article presents and discusses vital elements of the theoretical model as well as opportunities and problems of a practical application. In Germany, the existing data structure seems to be a fairly good starting point. But it is also possible to ‚FRBRize‘ only virtually, without changing the stored data.

**Jia Liu: An Overview of the Digital Reference Services in German Libraries**

The paper reports a research project which intends to provide an overview of the digital reference services in German libraries. Within the project, web sites of 286 German libraries were visited, among which totally 62 libraries (21.7 %) provide at least one kind of digital reference service and 47 libraries replied to the researcher's inquiries via either chat or email. The project focuses on outlining the online reference service provided in these 47 libraries from various aspects. It is concluded that mostly the digital reference service in German libraries is at the primary phase for the time being. Though there are some problems resulting from the traditional service idea in German libraries, the good thing is that the situation is changing to the better direction. More and more German libraries start to recognize the necessity and importance of the online reference service and are taking actions.

**Tom Becker: IdeaStore Am Gasteig? Methods and first practical results of a scenario based creative workshop for the future of the Munich central public library for space, function and service**

University courses are given online, students use blogs, wikis and social networking sites to create information and thus become authors themselves. This paper reports about the 29th annual IATUL conference, held in Auckland, New Zealand, discussing diverse aspects of web 2.0, national and international e-science infrastructure projects and the role of libraries therein.
